ANNUAL REPORT

Assumption College for Sisters (ACS), sponsored by the Sisters of Christian Charity and founded in 1953, first as an extension of Seton Hall College (now University) and then separately ncorporated in 1961 as an independent college, authorized to confer as AA degree on religious women and those in formation or a religious congregation. Until now, it has been housed within he Motherhouse of the Sisters of Christian Charity in Mendham,

Times are changing. Since 1899, the Sisters have maintained two arge properties: the Motherhouse, first in Wilkes-Barre, PA and hen in Mendham, NJ, along with Holy Family Convent and nfirmary in Danville, PA. It is now time to bring the Sisters from Danville to the Mendham property. To make this possible, Assumption College for Sisters is in process of planning a move to he Morris Catholic High School campus, Denville, NJ, this Summer, 2015 when the summer session is completed.

This is both a challenging and exciting opportunity for ACS. The administration and students of Morris Catholic High School look orward to the presence of religious women from the United States and developing nations on their campus. ACS students look orward to a first-hand glimpse of Catholic secondary education. Ve entrust this move to your prayers.

Ve can assure you that at our new site, the College is, and will still remain, the embodiment of the heritage received from Blessed Pauline von Mallinckrodt who founded the congregation in Paderborn, Germany in 1849. It witnesses to her conviction that he Sisters should be well-prepared, both spiritually and professionally, to spread the Kingdom of God through sound education, from which, in her words, "flows the temporal and external welfare of the individual and of society."

Assumption College for Sisters is licensed by the Commission on Higher Education of the State of New Jersey and accredited by he Middle States Commission on Higher Education, 3624 Market Street, Philadelphia, PA, 19104, (267)284-5000. The College sarned its initial accreditation in 1965 and reaffirmation of accreditation in 1975, 1985, 1995, and 2005. ACS is currently in process of Self-Study leading to reaccreditation in 2016.

The College is a member of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools and the Association of Catholic Colleges and Universities. It is an approved member of the Student and Exchange Visitor System (SEVIS) of the United States Department of Homeland Security.

Mission and Goals

Assumption College for Sisters exists primarily to educate vomen called to a life of service in the Roman Catholic Church. (Mission Statement)

Rooted in its 62 year history, the education of women called by 3od to the consecrated life remains the heart of the mission of Assumption College for Sisters. Blessed Pauline von Mallinckrodt, oundress of the Sisters of Christian Charity, always intended that ier Sisters be as well prepared professionally as their lay counterparts.

Since its actual founding in 1953, Assumption College for Sisters has provided a religious environment in which a young religious's pirit would be nurtured while she is in the process of attaining an academic degree.

The goals of Assumption College for Sisters clearly support its nission. This is demonstrated by the involvement of the religious vomen who are students at the college, whether they are nembers of the sponsoring congregation, those of neighboring eligious congregations, or international Sisters here on scholarship. A few examples provide illustration.

Integrated Religious Formation

Throughout its history, Assumption College for Sisters has consistently maintained its focus and distinctive mission of

Educating women religious. By providing sound theology and philosophy courses in an atmosphere of integrity and shared rision, the administration and faculty strive to enhance the eligious formation of the students within the context of their own listinctive community charisms." (Bulletin 2013-2016)

Annually, the women in initial formation for the Sisters of Christian Charity attend the "Here I am, Lord" Conference, Mount St. Mary, Emmittsburg, MD, a weekend event.

t has become a tradition that both the Orientation Day liturgy as vell as the Graduation liturgy reflect the cultures and languages epresented by the international Sisters here at the college.

Each year, Most Rev. Arthur J. Serratelli, bishop of the diocese of Paterson in which Assumption College for Sisters is located, hosts a gathering for young religious of the diocese. Several students rom Assumption College for Sisters were invited and benefited rom the inspirational liturgy celebrated by the bishop and enjoyed lis words of encouragement. In addition, several students participated in the Paterson Diocesan Mid-Day Prayer in honor of the Year for Consecrated Life.

The Sisters of Christian Charity sponsored a dramatic performance on St. Faustina which was attended by all ACS students residing at the Motherhouse.

As opportunities present themselves in the curriculum, the history, raditions and charisms of the members of religious congregations attending the college are shared.

An alumna of ACS, currently the province leader of the Franciscan Sisters of St. Elizabeth, invited ACS international students to the *Transitus*" service at their Motherhouse on the eve of the feast of St. Francis. Several students attended and were greatly inspired. First year students were also invited to the celebration of the canonization of the founder of the Franciscan Sisters of St. Elizabeth, St.Ludovico of Casoria.

As part of the Year for Consecrated Life, various religious communities attending ACS had an "Open House", sharing the life and ministries of the Sisters.

Leadership

ACS strives to form women who will be a light for the world and a eaven in society. Whatever form their service may take, Assumption's students need to be prepared to assume the esponsibility of Christian leadership and the commitment to bring, hrough countercultural witness, the Gospel message to God's people. The College aims to instill qualities of leadership in its students..." (Bulletin 2013-2016).

Students exercise their leadership skills in organizing and presenting various programs of entertainment for both the Motherhouse community as well as for the public.

Members of the student body also join the administration of the College on parish visits to raise awareness of the mission.

SCC students and Salesian students of ACS conduct religious education classes as well as sacramental retreats for elementary school students in a neighboring parishes. Salesian novices conduct periodic Youth Nights for high school and college students.

Community

Community, founded on service and respect for each person's lignity, ranks among Assumption's most cherished values. ntrinsic to its heritage, the College strives to further the vision of 3lessed Pauline and the spirit of Christian Charity she imparted to 1er Sisters" (Bulletin 2013-2016).

Despite the fact that the college student body speaks several lifferent languages as their native tongue, a great spirit of Christian love and unity exists among them.

\tau true community experience exists in what is known as the Sister to Sister" program. Cornerstone women, retreat

participants from St. Joseph Parish, Mendham, have partnered with our international Sister-students. They have provided riendship and encouragement for the fourth consecutive year.

Also, as part of the civic community in which ACS is situated, several students attended the local Labor Day Parade in Aendham, experiencing this tradition for the first time. In the neighboring community of Bernardsville, NJ, A Veterans Day nemorial service was held and attended by ACS first year nternational students.

The Vietnamese celebration of Tet (Vietnamese New Year), the nost important and popular holiday which celebrates the arrival of 3pring, was celebrated by all students as well as

he Motherhouse community. Beginning with Eucharistic liturgy, he celebration continued into the evening meal prepared by the /ietnamese students, during which the international student body is well as the young women in the SCC formation program provided entertainment.

Service

Service, central to Christian discipleship, is an essential aspect of ACS. Students are expected to avail themselves of opportunities o prepare for a life of service in the Church" (*Bulletin* 2013-2016).

The dedicated, loving, generous service offered by alumnae in schools, health care, parishes, retreat ministry, and other ninistries both in the United States and developing nations, provide convincing confirmation of the irreplaceable value of Assumption College for Sisters.

On a regular basis, resident students respond to college and Motherhouse hospitality needs, offering service to both retreat centers: Villa Pauline and Quellen Spiritual Center.

3oth the young women in initial formation as well as the nternational students entertained with song and dance at the lubilee celebration for the Sisters of Christian Charity.

Prior to and during the Caring Basket Gala, the major fundraiser or ACS, students assisted with various tasks: selling of raffle ickets, serving as greeters, and providing entertainment.

As part of their religious formation, the SCC students in initial ormation assist the formation directresses in vocation outreach and provide service to the local mission houses when needed. They also take part in events which allow them the opportunity to speak in small or larger groups on the topic of vocation and the call to religious life. They also assist in tutoring local elementary school students in need of help.

The Sisters from neighboring religious congregations, Salesian Bisters and Sisters of Divine Vocation, are actively involved in the apostolates of their respective congregations, whether it be retreat vork or early childhood education.

Social Justice

Growing out of a firm belief in the dignity of each person, faculty and students at ACS strive to see the face of Jesus in all. They seek ways to embrace the poor and eliminate systems of appression worldwide" (*Bulletin* 2013-2016).

On September 21, the International Day of Peace Day ACS students led the commemorative service, carrying in procession he flags of the nations represented here at the College.

Students of Th 098 Fundamentals of the Catholic Faith class had an extensive tour and explanation of the various outreaches of Corpus Christi Parish, Chatham Township, NJ.

Curriculum

The liberal arts curriculum provides the principal vehicle of academic instruction at Assumption College for Sisters. Approved by the Commission on Higher Education of the State of New lersey, the curriculum gives priority to Catholic theology and philosophy.

The curriculum at Assumption College for Sisters is designed to eflect a global perspective that incorporates an awareness of and espect for the viewpoints, cultures, and customs of all peoples. Through the teaching and study of the contributions of the world community to humankind, ACS strives to broaden student norizons by realizing the connectedness of all individuals whose common needs call each person to strive for the peace and justice of Gospel teaching" (*Bulletin* 2013-2016).

Commenting on this very statement, Pope Francis has said: "If our schools do not create another way of being human, another culture and another society, we lose our time. It is better to have ree and responsible learners, capable of asking themselves questions, to decide at the risk of making mistakes rather than to produce more replicas of our own successes or our own failures."

Although ACS emphasizes the liberal arts, current technology provides a useful tool in the learning process. Each classroom is equipped with internet access, a laptop and LCD projector. The wo Epson *BrightLink* Interactive projectors are used extensively by faculty.

The new technology has enabled instructors to use new echniques in teaching. Both Ph 205 Historical Introduction to Philosophy and Ph 203 Philosophy of the Human Person have become blended courses. A blended course combines the raditional face-to-face classroom with an online learning environment. With the assistance of the course management system (CMS) application named *Coursesites*, a free version of Blackboard, the instructor is able to deliver and manage course content, assignments, learning resources, student's progress, and student's grades online. Through the use of audio and video ectures, which are uploaded on the CMS application, and supplementary videos and articles, students access their course content prior to having their face-to-face class.

Students are challenged to make use of online educational tools such as *Blendspace*, *Google Hang Out*, *Google Applications and Drive*, and *Google Shared Documents*. These resources have

enriched, expanded, and extended the learning environment beyond the classroom walls.

Google Hang Out has been used by both the ESL instructor and he Theology instructor in the spring semester when traditional classes could not be conducted due to severe weather.

All curricular offerings are faithful to the mission and goals of Assumption College for Sisters and faithful to the Catholic ntellectual tradition in which every discipline is open to searching or the good, the true and the beautiful.

Enrollment

At the conclusion of the 2014-15 academic year, there were 49 students enrolled, including both full-time and part-time: 20 nternational students, 5 Sisters of Christian Charity, 17 Sisters rom local religious communities, and 7 lay students.

Administration and Faculty

Throughout the 2014-15 academic year, administration and faculty have been involved in the research and compiling of the Middle States Self-Study in preparation for the Accreditation visit in March 2016.

ACS faculty and administrators have made professional contributions outside the institution:

The College Registrar has served as ministry leader for the Pre-Cana program at Our Lady of Lourdes Parish, Whitehouse Station, NJ. She has organized an assembly featuring Holocaust curvivor testimony at Readington Middle School. In addition she has served as team captain for the

Valk to Find a Cure for Diabetes at Rutgers University/ Cook College.

The Theology instructor who is also the director of Sacred Heart Retreat Center, a ministry of the Salesian Sisters, has conducted several catechist workshops, Ministry Days, retreats and sacramental presentations for parents. She has provided numerous evening sessions throughout the diocese of Paterson on "Living and Proclaiming the Joy of the Gospel".

The Philosophy instructor has provided individual faculty sessions on various topics: Creating a Blackboard account, designing a course syllabus template, uploading documents, creating and charing folders in Google drive, how to edit, leave comments, and change editing settings on shared folders.

The Art History instructor participated in a focus group for a major extbook publisher developing on-line course materials in art listory. She is also finishing an article on two modern American sculptors.

The President has received the 2015 Recognition Award from the 3ayley Seton League of Seton Hall University, the oldest service organization at the University.

Alumnae Achievements

n the recent document, "Educating Today and Tomorrow: A Renewing Passion," the Congregation for Catholic Education acknowledged that "the real expected result" of education "is not he acquisition of information or knowledge, but rather personal ransformation." As a Sister-formation college, here at ACS, as we educate our students, we strive to provide the fertile ground for both formation and transformation.

line new members were added to the cadre of ACS alumnae with 3raduation 2015. Eight students received an AA degree and one in ARA degree.

Four Salesian novices and one lay student received their Certificates in Theological Studies during the commencement exercises. This was the first time in the history of the Certificate program that this was awarded to a layman.

Sister Mary Dominic Kopitar, SCC (ACS '82) was recognized as 2015 Alumna of the Year. After obtaining her AA, she received a 3A in Elementary Education from Felician College in Lodi, NJ. Sister Mary Dominic ministered in Catholic education for eleven rears in the Scranton and Paterson Dioceses. Presently, Sister as been serving the community as Provincial Secretary. In addition to her secretarial duties, Sister mentored postulants for several years and was a member of the leadership team as a provincial councilor for two years. She has served as Secretary at several international meetings of the congregation including the previous two General Chapters.

Sisters of Christian Charity, alumni of ACS are now ministering on our different continents:

n North America, the newly elected Provincial and Council are all alumni of ACS: Provincial Superior, Sister Mary Edward Spohrer ACS '63); Provincial Councilors Sister Marlene Weitzel (ACS '68), Sister Joann Marie Aumand (ACS '75), and Sister Marie Pauline Demek (ACS '73).

On the South American continent, Sister Celice Marie Gonzales ACS '12) has been missioned to serve in the Chilean Province where she ministers in both Chile and Bolivia. Although not an alumna, but rather, someone who served as support staff at ACS, Sister Sophia Marie Peralta has been missioned to serve in the Jruguay/Argentina Region.

On the European Continent, Sister Joanne Bednar (ACS '65) had been elected to serve as General Councilor for the North American Eastern Province and Western Region.

n Asia, Sister Martin Haubrich (ACS '67) once again traveled to he Philippines with the World Surgical Foundation where she assisted with a total of 222 operations on those persons who ordinarily would be deprived of such treatment

This summer an SCC sponsored initiative is providing a three veek international community living and service experience for the Sisters of the various provinces among the poor in Uruguay in ionor of the 200th birthday of Blessed Pauline von Mallinckrodt. From the North American Eastern Province, those participating ire: Sister Mary Joseph Albright, Sister Maria Lan Nguyen (ACS 95) and Sister Christina Marie Cables (ACS 91). From the Jruguay-Argentine Region, Sister Marisol Garcia (ACS 95) will participate.

Since the beginning of the college in 1953, 406 Sister students have received their AA or ARA degree. Since 2005, 95 students have graduated with degrees. 90 students received their AA Degree and 5 students received their ARA Degree. Of those eceiving an AA degree, 56 continued to study for an undergraduate degree. Of those who earned a Bachelor's Degree, 16 students went on to receive or are pursuing a Master's Degree and 1 is pursuing her doctorate. Eleven alumni are continuing in heir congregation's initial formation program or congregational ninistry.

n a recent Alumni survey sent to graduates within the past ten rears, it was revealed that our graduates are in active ministry in heir native lands, holding a variety of positions: teacher, Human

Academic and Cultural Enrichment

Students from FA 101, Drawing, accompanied instructor Dr. Catherine Doyle to the Center for Contemporary Art where they saw an exhibition entitled, "Line, Color and Surface" and met artist attending studio classes there. First Year international students visited the Morris County Courthouse to obtain their Morris County Resident ID Cards. While there, they learned about the county history and actual vorking of the Courthouse; they also met the County Commissioner.

Rev. Hubertus R. Drobner, STD, DD, enriched the Hi 101 World Civilization Class with a lecture on the "Fathers of the Church". Father Drobner is a priest of the Diocese of Mainz, Germany, and professor of Ecclesiastical History and Patristics in the Diocesan School of Theology, Paderborn, Germany. He holds doctorates rom the Universities of Mainz and Oxford, the Patristic Institute Augustinianum" and the Pontifical Institute of Christian Archaeology in Rome. He is the author of numerous books ncluding *The Fathers of the Church, a Comprehensive ntroduction.*

An integral part of the Th 098 course, Fundamentals of the Catholic Faith, is to familiarize the international Sister students vith aspects of ministry in the American Church. For the second consecutive year, Sister Margaret Dincher, SCC, Pastoral

Associate for Spirituality (ACS '64), has invited the class to visit Corpus Christi Parish for a tour of the facility and an explanation of he various ministries and outreach of the parish.

As part of the Ed 102 Health and Wellness course, students and nstructor Therese Tully toured the new Chambers Center for Well 3eing which is part of the Atlantic Health System, Morristown. There they participated in an energy therapy session. They also participated in an instructional session at the Carol W. & Julius A. Rippel Breast Center at Morristown Memorial Hospital.

Russian Orthodox priest Rev. George Hasenecz, former pastor of loly Trinity Church, Randolph, NJ, presented students of Hi 102 Vorld Civilization II with some history of the Russian Orthodox eligion including the underground Church during the years of Communism and the resurgence of faith after 1989. The class vas able to see some of the difference between Roman and Byzantine services and worship through samples of icons, eavened bread, vestments, crosses, prayer beads, etc. Inderstanding the meaning of symbolism not used in the Roman Catholic tradition was enriching for the students.

Students of ESL 108 Independent English Study and Hi 102, accompanied by instructors Dr. JoAnne Sylva and Sister Mary /eronica Kulsar, experienced the religious, architectural and aultural wonders of the Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart, Newark. A docent from the Central Synagogue in New York City explained how religious toleration developed in New Jersey and gave the historical background of the construction of the Cathedral. The associate organist at the Cathedral presented a ecture on the origin and composition of the world-famous organ and played an elaborate baroque piece.

On this same trip, students were treated to a luncheon as the Casa Seabra Portuguese Restaurant where they had the opportunity to sample one of the many cuisines represented in New Jersey.

The ACS Development Team has assisted in he creation and management of an Alumni and Friends Network. They have sent several e-mails encouraging alumni to stay connected and to update ACS with their status since graduating.

Another means of indirectly promoting ACS, was the accomplishment of the new Chair of the ACS Board of Trustees, Andrew Anselmi. A lawyer and author, he released his first book, Autumn Rush, in June 2015.

The ACS website, both colorful and informative, hosts photos of undraisers and other College events. There has been great success in getting news and feature stories in various local newspapers. ACS continues to seek avenues of involvement and apportunities for good public relations.

Updates

Several new members joined our Board of Trustees this year and Andrew Anselmi became our first lay chairperson. We are grateful o have Andrew, who not only is a busy lawyer and father of three shildren, but he is soon to be a best-selling author. His first book, The Autumn Rush, was just released in June 2015.

Assumption College for Sisters is preparing for the upcoming Middle States Accreditation Visit, March 13-16, 2016. The Middle States Commission on Higher Education oversees the accreditation of colleges, schools, and online universities in Delaware, the District of Columbia, Maryland, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Puerto Rico, and the United States Virgin slands. The first accreditation visit took place in 1965 and then ACS was re-accredited every ten years.

Gifts

Nany donations were received in the form of scholarship aid, Nemorial Scholarships and "Sponsor a Sister."

At a Christmas gathering at the new site for Assumption College or Sisters, attendees were presented with several naming options. To date, the following items were memorialized: President's office, dining hall, main classroom, five chapel pews, and several appliances.
